From Pastor Rob



Someone popped into my office recently and asked, 'So...what have you given up for Lent?' I smiled and snapped off something like, 'Not being nice to people!' And after a chuckle, they repeated the question.

I answered candidly and truthfully, 'Nothing, really.'

I do not go through the ritual of giving up something for Lent. For much the same reason, I do not make New Year resolutions, either. Instead, I try to think about what I truly need to be better able to be whom I need to be. I use the season to take stock, to rumble through the jumble of memories from the previous year. I note the things that did not go so well; and I mark those times when things did reach a high point. I usually discover that most of my life is somewhere between those two poles, rarely spending much time at either end of the spectrum.

Is that true for you, as well?

In the liturgical calendar of the Church universal, most of the year is marked as 'Ordinary Time.' There are great sweeps of it between the high holy days. Advent and Christmas get a month, as do Lent and Easter. Pentecost gets one Sunday. The rest of the year is just life as it is lived.

That seems appropriate to me. Our lives have special moments—we have those high holy days of births, deaths, birthdays, anniversaries, and so on—but there are great sweeps of time in which we just live.

With that being the case, what do we need to really live as God made us to live? Lent offers us a chance to think about that. As we go through the events of the previous year, stop at one of those rough spots—what would have



helped? What would have made it better? How might we have met that moment, perhaps keeping it from becoming one of those dark place? Do the same with the high points—what made everything work? Did we prepare for it? How did we meet that moment?

What we discover are ways to become better disciples. We discover the gifts and blessings that enable us to live faithfully and fully as people of God. We also discover those things that get in the way. We can begin to ponder how we might maximize the good stuff while minimizing the bad things. We can then set some goals and priorities for ourselves. Over the next year, what can I

do to build on the foundation of good things? What can I do to better use the gifts God gives me? We can also take stock of how to eliminate hard places. Is there something going for which I really need someone else's help? Are there things and situations where another person' eyes might help me better focus? Are there habits I need to break? Habits I need to pick up? What will help me be better able to hear God's voice and follow the direction God is leading me to take?

Adopting such a practice this season will help make Lent something richer and fuller. It will keep it from simply being the lead-in to spring. It can become a trove of blessings from which to make the rest of the year more what we would like it to be.

So, no, I do not really give anything up for Lent. Instead, I try to use it as a month-long refresher in what God made me to be, needs me to be, and wants me to be.

Try it. See what it does for you.


Hunter's Thoughts

We have recently celebrated Ash Wednesday - the beginning of our 40 days of preparation for Holy Week. As Protestants, many of us did not have that as part of our faith tradition as we grew up. Only in recent decades have most of us reclaimed Lent as a significant part of our spiritual journey. I have come to find Ash Wednesday and the rituals that surround it to be something that really deepens my understanding of God's love for us.

Once again this year, we had our traditional Ash Wednesday service in our sanctuary. But we also have one of those holdovers from the Covid years - we are still offering a "drive-through" time during the day for people who may not be able to get to a service. For me and Rob and Andrea, along with Terri Garrison and Kristy Maddux, it is a blessing to be part of these special moments. This year, we had more than 40 people who took advantage of this opportunity to embrace their

faith. What was really significant is that about two thirds of these people were not church members but are from our surrounding community.

Some said this was the only chance they would have on a busy day to be able to get ashes. Others do not currently have a local church home and were thankful for the outreach that Mallard Creek PC was providing. And some have never been part of a church and may have even grown up in a different faith. Several wanted to know more about the meaning of Ash Wednesday and Lent and Holy Week and what it all means. It was an honor in those moments to get to



share about what our Christian faith means.

I was thinking about the variety of people who had come through that line when I sat down in my office and looked up at a painting I have long had right above my desk. It is by Norman Rockwell and has the words of the Golden Rule printed across it - "Do Unto Others As You Would Have Them Do Unto You" - based upon Jesus' words in Matthew 7:12. I could not help but look at those faces and think about the many different people that now make up our community and our world. Faces that may look very different but all belong to God's children.

Over these next weeks, as we prepare our hearts to remember Christ's great sacrifice for us and his ultimate victory over sin and death, we are reminded that God sent the Son into all the world. One of our challenges is to make sure that we let everyone know about that. But we can all do so by sharing our hearts and our faith with others - because God has first loved all of us.



GREETING FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE



The Finance Committee brings you greetings and a huge thank you for your time and financial support to MCPC. With your support we were able to pay off the loan on our new gathering space in 2022 and we are now debt free. In response to our December letter you responded with the largest December collection we have ever re-

ceived. Your response reduced the 2022 yearly deficient to \$66,000.00.

The Finance committee and the Session are looking at ways to reduce our costs to balance the 2023 budget. This will be a very difficult task as most of our expenses are tied to staff (50%) or in reoccurring facility costs --- i.e.: electric, gas, water, insurance, building upkeep and ground maintenance. However we have little choice as our reserves will only last so long unless we reduce spending, increase collections or a combination of the two.

MCPC has seen other lean times over its 200-year history. The impact of the covid stoppage along with other factors has reduced the participation at MC and many other houses of worship. The ministry of MC will continue. The question is how it



will look or differ from the past. Your officers and staff cannot express how grateful they are for your continued support. Please spend family time in prayer for guidance on how you may support the ministry of MCPC. Your comments or suggestions are welcomed. Please contact a member of Finance or any Elder. Your name will not be repeated if you so desire, but we need member input.


